Our House empowers homeless and near-homeless families and individuals to succeed in the workforce, in school, and in life through hard work, wise decisionmaking, and active participation in the community.

To Our Community,

At Our House, we consider it our responsibility to do as much as we can to help struggling families in our state transform their lives. We have an approach that works—by forming a partnership with our clients, supporting the whole family, and empowering them to achieve their goals, we are able to offer a real pathway out of homelessness.

In the data, in the stories, and in our daily interactions, we see families achieving incredible things and building a better life for themselves one step at a time. **We also see a huge level of need-more than we are currently able to meet. Every month, nearly 100 families call seeking a bed in our Shelter.** Thus, we are working as hard as we can to make this pathway out of homelessness available to more people. We are halfway through a significant expansion that, over the course of just two years, will fully double our capacity to serve families in need. Our board and our staff are stepping up to take on this challenge, and thankfully, our supporters are stepping up right alongside us. The support we get from thousands of donors, volunteers, partners, and encouragers each year makes our work possible and inspires us to take it to the next level.

A Season Of Growth

2024 marked a season of growth for Our House as we proudly opened the doors to our new Family Support Center and Mabee Family House. These spaces have quickly come to life, and being able to put them to good use helping people has been the highlight of our year. Children in Bright Beginnings are thriving in their new gym space, while our Children's Therapists now have a multitude of options for tailoring their play therapy sessions. Our health clinics saw **350 patients** in the past year, offering them not only more privacy but also improved access to essential healthcare services. The Mabee Family House has already made a profound difference in the lives of homeless families– housing **94 residents** since opening.

In total, Our House touched the lives of 3,325 individuals last year.



Making An Impact in Arkansas



For 38 years, Our House has worked to transform our campus into a one-stop shop program that helps stabilize Arkansas families.

Over the past three years, our Shelter residents came to us from 61 of Arkansas' 75 counties.

As the only comprehensive service provider in the state that can accommodate homeless families of any shape and size, we serve as a hub and resource for the entire state of Arkansas.

We see families travel across the state and country-41 different US states-to access our unique services.


New Beginnings The Dominguez Family

Brenda came to Our House in 2024 fleeing domestic violence, in a bad financial situation, and needing a safe place for herself and her three children. Fortunately, our new Mabee Family House had just opened, and the Dominguez family became one of the first families to move in. Brenda's older children, Rey and Reina, got enrolled in school and were able to attend our expanded Our Club youth program, while her youngest, Riana, who had just turned one, enrolled in our expanded Bright Beginnings program. With housing and quality childcare secured, Brenda got to work building a new life for her family. She worked closely with our Career Center team, who helped her find a job at a phone company and begin saving money. Brenda is a part of our Stability Program, and her case manager, Daniella, helped her find an new apartment for her family in just three months. Since moving out, Brenda has continued working with Daniella to achieve her goals, including finding a childcare for Riana closer to their new home, and finding a better job. Brenda now works at a leasing agency where she earns more money and has a more fulfilling role. Brenda now shares vacancies at her company with Our House, so we can connect other client families with housing opportunities.



"We have tried to take that energy and structure into our lives outside of Our House. We have a schedule, we have chores, we have activities as a family." But Brenda says it is the connections with people that has been most important: "The compassion and patience of my case manager helped me turn my life around."



Health & Wellness Fair

In 2024, Our House proudly hosted our first combined Summer Kickoff and Health & Wellness Fair, an event that brought together families, youth, and community partners in a celebration of summer and well-being. We welcomed over 150 youth, alongside their parents, to Our Club's exciting summer program, while more than 20 community partners came out to share essential wellness resources with our clients. It was a sun-filled day of fun with free haircuts, bounce houses, face painting, and refreshing the resources and support they need to succeed long after they leave Our House.

Reentry Program

In partnership with the Little Rock Workforce Development Board, we assisted 149 reentry clients in 2024, with our Reentry Case Manager spending dedicated time visiting jails to connect clients to employment and other resources before their release. This joint program ranked #1 in the nation for clients placed in unsubsidized jobs! Our House also supervised 1,005 community service hours in 2024, saving our clients \$11,000 in court fines. Our Reentry Program supported clients like Mr. Gambil, who Our House connected to housing, employment, anger management classes, and recovery support. Mr. Gambil has thrived since his release, and he now manages two Subway locations!



College Ready

Our Club took five high school students on our second ever overnight field trip for an inspiring college tour at Belhaven University and Jackson State University. The trip provided students with an in-depth look at campus life, the differences between private and state colleges, and insights into potential career paths and scholarship opportunities. One of our students, a Shelter resident at the time, was particularly energized by the trip, realizing how she could turn her interest in photography into a career. Motivated by the experience, she has since decided to take on a photography position for her high school sports team to gain more experience before entering college!

New Beginnings The Girley Family

Jada is a mother of five whose marriage ended in 2024. For about a month, Jada and her children lived in her car, but at the urging of her mother she came to Our House in April 2024. The Girleys were the second family to live in our new Mabee House!

Jada's young children were able to immediately enroll in our expanded Bright Beginnings Child Development Center, and her older children enrolled in our Our Club after-school program. With care for her children secured, Jada was able to get the support she needed, both from our mental health team and from our Career Center. Jada enrolled in our job-training program, where she was able to get experience working in the Our House Resale Store & Donation Centers, and after which she was able to get a steady job as a bus driver, making good wages. Income from her job allowed Jada to find a great apartment for her family, which they moved into in March 2025, less than a year after coming to Our House. Jada's children continue to attend Bright Beginnings and Our Club, and she stays connected with her case manager. Jada is focused on building a new stable life for her family, while also working towards new goals like completing her education and building a new career in a caring profession.

Jada's success is due to her own hard work, but she also gives credit to the support she received from Our House: "It's a great program. It's a great place to be. It helps people get on their feet."





Looking Ahead Building New Beginnings

Our House is launching the final phase of our campus expansion—*Building New Beginnings.* We are creating 11 additional housing units to meet the ever present need in our community to house homeless families together. We will simultaneously expand the operational capacity of our campus and wrap-around services offered to our families by building dedicated space for operational support, case management, and mental health services.

New Beginnings Andrew

Andrew was released from prison last year and found himself standing on the edge of an uncertain future. Originally from Oklahoma, Andrew had no one to turn to in Arkansas. "I'm going to end up under an overpass," Andrew thought. "My family told me, 'you are 32, you've got to figure it out,' and that is where I saw myself ending up." Andrew used the last money he had to take a Lyft to Our House, and a bed came open at exactly the right time. Andrew went to the Career Center on a daily basis, putting in hundreds of applications in his first weeks at Our House without any success. Never giving up on himself, Andrew took the initiative to connect with our team to get placed in our 9-month job training program at the Our House Resale Store, who are able to make accommodations for Andrew's epilepsy.

Andrew has now been at Our House for 8 months, and he is not letting his past define his future. Andrew attends recovery meetings to keep up two years of sobriety, and he is quickly growing his savings-over \$3,000 in just his first 3 months! The Career Center helped Andrew enroll in health insurance to ensure he receives his epilepsy medication, and his position at the store pushed Andrew to learn new skills. "I've gained so much wisdom and knowledge from the rest of the team. Every person there has a unique flavor they bring to the table, and we all learn from each other," Andrew says. With this position now added to his resume, Andrew secured a full-time job within days of exiting the job training program!

"Sometimes you have to go through something so negative to make your life so positive," Andrew says. "This program has allowed me to stand on my own two legs and continue to go forward." Andrew is now reconnecting with his friends and family in Oklahoma, and he is full of appreciation for the patience, wisdom, and stability he has gained at Our House.
